Gave introduction of herself, lived in Denver, upon changes, and looking forward working the prior committee member, by investigating, and not re-invent the wheel. And what Marilyn Reed can share about the Humanitarian member.

Miranda Morales: gave information of her background; long life resident; 2001 served on the committee when in college; applied this to be a service for the community; and appreciated being selected.

Leland Jones: couple of years ago did serve on CLUPC; truly believes we will move forward.

Marilyn Reed: just want to congratulate the new CLUPC members, they will help the Cameron community for they are in dire needs; prior community members are willing to work collaborative with the new members address needs of our community members.

S. Robbins: there is a lot of work esp. moving toward certification; previous CLUPC worked hard even when the chapters were lock down through text etc. Google.net working on water issues, almost got it down which new members can bring back.

Marilyn Reed: gave thanks and encourage working together toward the same goal about land use plan. Those that are joining the clan, and encourage to speak your language, the child that is born today, that as elders will lead. If you going to lead the community you have to learn the language, and as young people cannot always to rely on the English language, learn the language to help your community members. We can help too, as well as our leaders.

Lisa Robbins: gave statement concerning being selected by giving her introduction; majoring in public health, and wants to work with the committee in any way I can.

G. Natasha Begay – TCRHCC – Radiation Exposure Screening/Education Program Presentation; Dr. Frank Dailchow, 1925-1958- is the early detection, and onward first respondent program that got started with the hospital; RECA program – year 2000 started, it compensates on site or at the site exposure, innocent will have \$50k compensation, or \$100k up to 1972. NNP present to extend the deadline done last week, not sure if get extension  
Dr: oncology program started 2 years ago seeing a lot of patients exposed; got grant to catch patients at the early stage of exposure and that is the purpose of our program

Natasha: did presentation in Navajo language pertaining to early detection to receive screening. And gave deadline of dates for screening.

S Robbins: question about study done, and we do not get the study done as well as other entities. We ask NN about data or report, and request that it forward to have EPA do a library of these studies, and there are no records.

Dr.: this is not a study, its basis screening for the patients, and other screening mentioned are recommended and this is educational program; these can be provided by any health care facility.

Mae Franklin: community raised an issue about testing or about funding coming to identify uranium, and in Cameron is 100 identified, not all EPA doing it. Further area to be identified would be around residential area.

Dr. Dailchow – just focus on the fall-out of Nevada; not have knowledge of Cameron area, have not seek other grant to apply other coverage;

Natasha: only RECA is our focus.

S. Robbin: there is no Plan of Operation just have T26; have not seen the resolution or meet about it; and gave history of 2014 onward on resolution; (having technical issues with the computer-lost information from time to time-meeting is recorded);

CP; Plan of Operation – is our Five Management System is our P of O; ASC approved this resolution to be discussed at this regular meeting.

S. Robbins: just want to tell you this; ADHOC was not in place, they is not much going on;

Has another question; chapter meeting – this does not have anything to do with Covid –

VP: this was sent to ASC for approval that is why it is on the agenda.

Ilene Tohannie: want to make a comment - Black Fall is where she is from; this discussion, greatly benefit our community, and this is what we are saying, and had been impacted, drinking uranium water cooking their foods. Elders have a long way to get assistance; ADHOC has done a lot and do not understand why this is happening.

Marilyn Reed: want to make a comment; feel that our voice we can make comment and right to do so, really concern about this resolution, and implication for others as well as Cameron. There was not enough information that was alluded to by Ilene about water, and why exactly this resolution was in place; and if we really value the voices of the community to share our thoughts in a certain way. Thank you as our leaders, it is your job to listen to the community, and without proper discussion create problems. Water and planting are really important. Perhaps have a task force in place to have a voice and concern, and just need to take it seriously.

number and media announcements. We are most transparent – thousands and thousands of calls; reported 2 months ago, a lot of calls made, help bring information closer to home. Chapter they are meant to be formal timed structure to address resolution, and pressured 4 minutes before getting to the structured items. GC reopening; there is a CMA – passed March of 2020, it is a council resolution put in to place closure to NN; by law we have to recede – opening back Hwy 89 from GC to Flagstaff, but have to travel on the NN road. We are in contact with GC – mgr, Mr. Landon, Mr. Keebo at NNRC mtg. East entrance; and out of respect for NN and people to keep it close until it is safe to open for Covid19 case and Cameron has a hot spot for Covid. Is Cameron safe, we do not know, we are in home, shelter in place, can't visit each other, but this is the hospital opinion about status of Covid. Our number is low, and vaccination is low, we can go back to GC national park, and economic side, we support the road side vendors. Page city, are pleading for reopening of GC, it is up to them to lobby for their economic interest, local government, their representative the 3-chapter officials – we listen to them, they advise us, they lead us, not bog down in ...heavy equipment's Chapter purchased, authorized by appropriating own fund Sihasin money. Be in line with goals and endeavor. 110 chapter purchased equipment; it was identified by CARES ACT money given to all; advise was given on financial the controller, \$24 million for heavy equipment, earth moving equipment. Now awaited delivery. When delivered take a snap shot to share. NNP did not veto this request. Emergency funding less than \$25k will get \$5k; Cameron still have \$25k, for the NN will not give more to Cameron due to still having \$25k; rational was reasonable and legible; it is best to use emergency resources that is available then use chapter emergency fund after exhausted other funds. FEMA, CDC, rushed to timeline of Dec 30 2020; was not perfectly done; have 2 years to spend and plan for the expenditure of American Rescue Plan \$11 Billion will go to several agency. IHS, BIA that provide direct services to the NN tribe. Not know what amount 714 million was the CARES ACT; \$8 BILLION, \$20 million spend twice the amount. Our share, BIE – look at pie chart – 1/3 goes to Navajo; just like HIS; to land base, population, courts, and based on federal related operation; maybe \$3 billion going to NN...early, do not have specific information yet.

SR: water rights had not been addressed adequately. It is difficult and time consuming. Not we got at least 3-years to be ready. Have to give report to NNP and NNC. \$20 billion is approximately receive, worked with OEH, due to all department shut down. OEH had zero fund for bathroom additions; CLUPC – did not have any funds. July28th - \$32 million, it got drop and \$5 million, both got table; Jason John – got some funds from approved Dec 8<sup>th</sup>, drilled 14 years (nation got 20 years – water resource do not have the staff either.

B. Chapter President: 2 months on the job now, and working hard to deal with projects, Grand Canyon Park reopening; CLUPC – 8 interested and selected 5. Demolition of the Condemned chapter building, it has asbestos; need help only have 3 people working in Adm.; NTUA water – still working on that one, need fresh water. the way it is set up it really is not our fault;

S Robbin: made recommendation to share project progress with the community members

CP: CLUPC will make these their project.

C. Vice President: participate in WNA – learning new things, nominated for Sect. for WNA; burial assistance is for all Navajos whether they live on or off the reservation; 2 water trucks received by NN – to do maintenance and protocol to have them on the chapter premise.

D. Secretary/Treasurer: back at school – 03-31-21 start in person instruction, feel scary but have to do; Marshall School in Flagstaff had 8 positive students after school reopen, so it is scary. Students still have a choice to continue virtual learning even thou in person instructions is back on for students. Nominated for D3C- Secretary and VP is D3C President; good going forward.

E. Western Farm Board: report made – request doing the land issues correctly by working diligently together and recommended certification to invite non-profit organization to work with. Going back to traditional practice will help remedy the world events giving us hope and pray for better days. Will continue with the permittee's meetings.

F. TCRHCC: will build Bodaway/Gap health center by the Gap school: laundry building is on schedule but may go pass march deadline; gas line still be worked: other health projects are on scheduled and sometime behind but will all be completed by April 2021. Dental chairs will be installed at Sacred Peak clinic. Covid update – not receive numbers, but Cameron doing very good with vaccination; gave percentage of different types of vaccine given for 16 years and older. Advantage is one shot and you are fully vaccinated. Evaluation is being done on variants.
